roof positive we live in a digital age, Leighann was in Spain when she was asked if she would be interested in working at Our WorkPlace! She told us that she's always been interested in adult education, and as a lifelong learner herself, she really enjoys working in the field.

Chances are that when someone comes into Our WorkPlace for the first time, they'll talk to Leighann before anyone else, because her role involves doing intake for the programs offered by the employment readiness program run by Our Place Society. She's been with Our WorkPlace for just over a year, and told us that "it's super fun, keeps me on my toes, and no two days are the same". Leighann tries to inspire clients to pursue education and is incredibly impressed by how so many of them express a strong wish to move forward in their lives.

Before coming to Our WorkPlace, Leighann worked with people with mental health challenges, including seniors in restorative care and in intimate group care situations. At Our WorkPlace, the programs being offered – People in Progress and Digital Job Hunters – are very much geared to individual goals. Indeed, there are instances where a program can be modified to suit a particular client's needs.

Leighann stresses the need for consistent and clear communication between staff and clients. Workshop participants are allowed to be vulnerable. As she says, "everyone who comes in





takes a chance, and showing up is half the battle!" She also believes that it's OK to stay in a place of not knowing.

As clients work through their programs at Our WorkPlace, they find their own way. Their end goal may not be getting a job but might instead be moving on to further education or demonstrating the skills they've gained in a volunteer position. As Leighann says, "the key is to move forward with confidence".

In terms of the future at Our WorkPlace, Leighann sees the programming constantly evolving, and she is hopeful that it continues to expand. She told us she appreciates that every day is different, and the opportunity to develop and build new friendships.

Outside of the office, Leighann is focused on family, food, dogs, and life in general.

VOLUNTEER PROFILE JENNIFER WOPPENKAMP

t's been more than three years since Jennifer joined the group of volunteer workshop facilitators at Our Work-Place, and, in conversation with her recently, it's clear her commitment to our clients hasn't diminished one little bit during that time.

"Every group is different," she says, but the energy in the room is always palpable. "I go into each workshop knowing that anyone could be in that room, that our futures are not defined, and that beliefs about who we are don't have to determine our lives."

Jennifer has found that many of the workshop's participants have become what they believe about themselves. She believes that it's important for everyone to build healthy boundaries around money. Some of those she teaches believe in giving to others. However, along with that desire, she teaches that it's OK to say "no" and that we are all worthy of holding on to wealth.

The 2-day workshops Jennifer leads at Our WorkPlace are focused on the stories we tell ourselves about ourselves and the way money works. As a financial services professional, she understands how money works, but recognizes that many of those she teaches don't. "I get how money can show up for them," she told us. "But I want to interrupt the repeating stories and beliefs around money." Jennifer recognizes her students may never have been taught about ways to handle money while still at home and may have no idea of what can happen if they must deal with a financial professional.

Her compassion for the people she encounters through Our Place, and especially at Our WorkPlace, is driven by her understanding – along with the lived experience of members of her family – of inter-generational homelessness and poverty. Jennifer believes that compassion is



often missing in our community and as a society, we don't always understand or appreciate the Aboriginal experience.

When we asked Jennifer about future workshops at Our WorkPlace, she told us that, in addition to wanting to see them expanded, she would like to be able to follow up with past participants after they've moved on with their lives.

Outside of the classroom, Jennifer is a voracious learner with an endless capacity for knowledge. She is particularly interested in science. In fact, her favourite podcast to listen to now is Gastropod, which looks at food through the lens of science and history. She has two children who are both into sports and she enjoys being involved in everything they do. In addition, Jennifer can trace her love of cooking for a crowd to her Ukrainian roots!

Thank you, Jennifer, for all you continue to do for the clients of Our WorkPlace. Your kindness is changing lives.

"We love her!", said Carol. She also told us that every PIP graduate they have received on job placement has found and, most importantly, maintained employment. "Here at the Cook Street Activity Centre, we're focused on giving people a hand up and not a handout, and we'll always be happy to receive more PIP grads for job placement."
