Executive Director's Message

If the last year is any indication, 2016 is going to be a busy time of change and transformation.

There has been a lot of attention in the public consciousness this winter about the need for affordable housing. The spotlight is certainly warranted as so many vulnerable people have grown tired of being ignored and left to live in tents and doorways.

At Our Place, we are responding by opening our facility at 6:30 a.m., allowing access to hot food, dry clothing and clean, warm showers. This winter, however, we felt it was important to do even more.

To that end, we opened a new winter shelter at First Metropolitan United Church that opens at 7:30 p.m. and runs seven nights a week. The shelter opened with 40 mats that were available to individuals, couples and people with pets.

Almost immediately upon opening, the shelter was filled. After the first month, we secured additional funding to expand the shelter to 50 mats.

What's truly incredible about this shelter is the community that is being built there. When people don't have to expend all their energy wondering where they will lay their heads at night or where to store their belongings, they can begin to focus on positive change.

Our Place's Outreach team works with the shelter occupants to help make those first



connections toward a brighter future.

And we plan to do more.

At the time I write this, Our Place is working with our community partners on opening a temporary, 24/7 shelter that is intended to be a stepping stone to permanent housing for those who need it most.

We are also gearing up for the next step of our employment program. Our goal is to bring in expertise that will help people gain pre-employment skills, training and ultimately employment, plus the support needed to stay employed

It's a big task, but we believe it is possible.

For the last three years, Our Place volunteer Linda Ryder has dedicated her Christmas to collecting as many presents as possible.

But before you get jealous, she gives all of them away to vulnerable people who might otherwise go without.

Ryder runs Angel Gifts, a program that has been in existence for 13 years with co-ordination passed from hand to hand. Through the generosity of her fellow Our Place volunteers, local churches, schools, community groups and government offices, Ryder helped hand out over 750 personalized presents to people living in poverty on Dec. 16.

"It means so much to people to receive a gift that is meant just for them," says Ryder. "I get so many hugs that I can't stop smiling."

Each gift has an approximate value of \$40, and "angels" are encouraged to add a personal message to the recipient.

"It's truly wonderful to witness the community coming together like this and spread the true meaning of Christmas," says Don Evans, executive director of Our Place. "Each gift is greeted with a smile of

appreciation, and the occasional giggle, which warms all our hearts."

A wonderful time was had by all at Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* presented by



Many of us face obstacles in our daily lives that challenge even the toughest individuals, but for Kari that very first obstacle nearly killed her. She was barely two months old.

ewborn and vulnerable, Kari was diagnosed with brain cancer that caused tumours to grow inside her tiny skull.

Surgeons were able to operate and save her life, but the damage severely affected her ability to retain memories.

It also made it impossible to learn.

Growing up, she floundered in school. Unable to read or write, Kari stumbled over obstacle after obstacle.

Her family life was never stable, and after being sexually assaulted at the age of 15 by a 40-year-old man, she ran away to live on the streets.

Her first stop was East Hastings in Vancouver, where at the age of 17, she was sexually assaulted again.

"I have gaps," she says. "Parts of my life are blank."

Life on the streets was difficult, and Kari soon found herself battling drug addiction.

"I was using everything," she says. "It was just what you did to stop the pain."

And yet the obstacles kept coming.

Without any stability in her life, she ended up in an unhealthy marriage. And although the union produced a baby daughter, along with her son from a previous relationship, the marriage soon collapsed.

Then, on a trip to the U.S., she fell on broken glass and had to be rushed to hospital for an operation on her knee.

During the operation, Kari was given a blood transfusion. The blood, however, was tainted with HIV, a virus that attacks the immune system. Since then, she's discovered that she also has Hepatitis C, an infectious disease affecting primarily the liver.

"I was told that I had ten years to live," she says. "But I'm still here."

That was 14 years ago.

The following years are a shambles of moving from low-rent housing to bouts of homelessness and back to low-rent housing.

Our Place's transitional housing program keeps you clean, it keeps you stable.

Kari ended up homeless again at the age of 38 when her one-bedroom apartment was invaded by bed bugs.

Five months ago, however, she secured a spot in Our Place's transitional housing program.

The top three floors of Our Place's building on Pandora contain 45 units of transitional housing for the hardest to house. There, residential housing support workers, along with a mental health and addictions clinician, work one-on-one with residents.

"There are a lot of rules," says Kari with

a small smile. "But it keeps you clean, it keeps you stable — and there are no bed bugs."

Working with Natalie, her housing support worker, Kari is learning how to set goals for her future. Part of that future includes helping out in the community.

While Kari has done some volunteer work at Our Place, she enjoys working with AIDS Vancouver Island (AVI) where she hands out harm-reduction supplies.

AVI also offers support services for people living with HIV/AIDS or Hepatitis C, which Kari participates in.

Moving forward, Kari is currently in a new relationship that she feels happy about.

Learning a lesson from her past, however, she isn't rushing into things. If it continues on a positive path, she hopes that one day soon she will be able to return to permanent housing.

Reiki





Jackie is wrapped in a warm blanket when Karen gently clasps her hands around Jackie's feet. "I can feel energy traveling up my entire body," Jackie says. "Like a weight being lifted."

The confession brings a smile to Karen's face. She has heard it before — many times — but each experience means something different to every person she treats.

For Jackie, it's Karen's palpable kindness as much as her life-long skill that brings her back each Friday for a Reiki treatment in Our Place's hygiene area.

Reiki is a healing technique based on the principle that the therapist can channel energy into the patient by means of touch, to activate the natural healing processes of the patient's body and restore physical and emotional well-being.

Karen has been "laying hands" on people since she was a child, but it was a life-changing motorbike accident that led her to formalize her training and become a Reiki practitioner.

In 2011, the accident left Karen in an ocean of pain, and suffering a head injury. As a former dancer and martial arts expert, the injuries made her frustrated as her body and brain didn't respond the way she wanted them to.

"I had to think about everything I did before I did it," she says. "Even brushing my teeth wasn't automatic. I had to make a plan."

Musical therapy was key to regaining her life. At her father's funeral in 2006, Karen's family sang "Somewhere Over The Rainbow". The song came to mean so much to her that she had the musical score tattooed over her entire body.

"It made me feel safe," she says. "It made me whole again."

One year ago, Karen arrived at Our Place to volunteer her healing services with weekly Reiki sessions, and the family has embraced her wholeheartedly. In fact, she can't walk too far without people rushing up and wanting one of her great hugs.

"It's an amazing experience," she says. "I wanted to give back what has been given to me, but I've received so much more."
